

Set Up PulsePoint for Brushfire Notifications on Your Phone

The PulsePoint app can push notifications to your phone to alert you to potential brush fires. A PulsePoint alert simply means that someone called 911 to report what they think is a brush fire. Many PulsePoint alerts turn out to be false alarms. But it is a good way to know that a fire might be happening. If you receive a PulsePoint fire notification, go to tcep.org/emergencystatus or @TCEP90290 on X or call the TCEP Hotline at 310-455-3000 to learn if it is a real fire that threatens the canyon. TCEP must verify the incident before posting so it may take some time for any details to appear. If it's a false alarm, we generally won't post any information.

- 1. Download the free app from your app store, then launch the app.
- 2. Tap the shield icon to the right of the **Home** icon at the bottom of the screen which takes you to the Agencies page.
- 3. In the search bar, search for Los Angeles County FD (Div 7). Tap the Follow button. Consider also following LAFD-West.
- 4. Tap the **Notifications** bell icon at the bottom.
- 5. Tap the check boxes next to **Confirmed Vegetation Fires**. Leave the other boxes unchecked to prevent PulsePoint from sending too many notifications to your phone.
- 6. Tap the **Home** icon on the far left of the bottom navigation menu.
- 7. In your phone settings, allow lock screen notifications for the PulsePoint app.
- 8. When a fire is reported, you will get a notification. Tap the notification to open PulsePoint. Tap the incident in the list to open a map showing the location. Tap the back arrow in upper left corner to go back to the main incident listing.
- 9. If you want to listen to fire dispatch radio, tap the speaker icon at top right to toggle the sound on or off.
- 10. To understand the colored labels scrolling under an incident, tap the three dots in the bottom navigation menu then tap Unit Status Legend.
